The topic Words can hurt or help

**The object** Popsicle sticks. For extra fun, videotape (or shoot with a Polaroid) the tongue-examination part of the lesson.

**The Jesson** Pass out the popsicle sticks and pair up students. Tell them to examine their partner's tongue. Next, give them five

minutes to write a poem about the tongue they inspected. Award the best writer with a popsicle.
