

## FOUR LOVES 3NOT ANOT

Reflect on these questions by yourself or with your group.

In Greek, the primary language of the New Testament, there are several different words for love—four, to be exact. Two of them appear prominently in the New Testament.

- Agape (uh-GAH-pay) is the unconditional love God shows us and the unconditional love we can likewise show to others (see I John 4:7).
- Philia (fill-EE-ah) is affectionate love for a friend (see Romans 12:10), from which we get the name Philadelphia.
- Eros (AIR-oss) is sexual love that desires another person, from which we get the word erotic. (The word eros doesn't appear in the New Testament, but the idea is all over the Jewish scriptures—especially the Song of Songs.)
- Storge (STOR-gay) is the love shared in healthy families. (This word is also absent in the New Testament, but present in spirit.)

Q: Think back a year and compare where you were then with where you are now in each of the four loves.
