YOUNG CHRISTIANS WORK TO END SLAVERY

ATLANTA—At this year's Passion conference, 60,000 young people raised more than \$3 million to combat modern-day slavery. The Freedom Campaign aims to rescue the estimated 27 million people entrapped in slavery and human trafficking.

This generation has "the potential to do anything," says Passion's Bryson Vogeltanz. "Jesus was the original abolitionist. We're just following what he's already done in our lives for us."

Conference attendee Sarah Stone says she intends to live her faith more fully. "Christianity isn't just about saying a prayer and going to church on Sunday; it's about living for Christ with every single thing you do."

NON-TIPPING PASTOR SPARKS DEBATE

ST. LOUIS—A pastor upset by an automatic tip unintentionally launched a viral firestorm. On her Applebee's bill, Alois Bell wrote, "I give God 10 percent. Why do you get 18?" and included "Pastor" with her signature.

"I've been stiffed on tips before," says waitress Chelsea Welch, "but this is the first time I've seen the Big Man used as reasoning." After Welch posted the receipt online and Bell complained, the waitress was fired.

Columnist Justin Lee says such "acts of ungrace" do great damage to Christianity's reputation and influence. He encourages believers to "give more than people expect."
