

Q8: What percentage of people using condoms for contraception become pregnant within the first year of use?

Q9: What percentage of adolescents who have had sexual intercourse are no longer sexually active?

Q10: What percentage of American males and females ages 15 to 19 are still virgins?

Check your answers.

Q1: More than 20 percent—that's about one in five—of Americans over the age of 11 show evidence of genital herpes.

Q2: About 66 percent—that's about two out of three—sexually transmitted infections occur in people under the age of 25.

Q3: 30 percent of women—seven of 10—don't get a high school diploma by age 30 if pregnant before age 18.

Q4: About .003 percent of Americans—that's three of every 10,000—are infected with HIV.

Q5: Up to 85 percent of women infected by chlamydia—that's almost nine out of 10—don't know they're infected because they have no obvious symptoms.

Q6: Up to 40 percent of men infected by chlamydia—that's four out of 10—don't know they're infected because they have no obvious symptoms.

Q7: 100 percent of people infected by chlamydia (who don't know they're infected because they have no obvious symptoms)—that would be 10 for 10 for those of you keeping score at home—are capable of infecting another person with the disease.

Q8: About 15 percent of people using condoms for contraception—more than one out of 10—become pregnant within the first year of use.

Q9: About 25 percent of adolescents who have had sexual intercourse—about one in four—stop soon after they start.

Q10: About 50 percent of American males and females ages 15 to 19—that's one in two—are still virgins.
