THE COST OF ENTERTAINMENT: Christians in the United States spend several times more money on leisure activities than on mission work and benevolent outreach. *U.S. News and World Report* estimated that Americans (at least half of whom are church members and many more of whom claim to be Christians) spend over \$244 billion on leisure activities each year. The gap between leisure spending and benevolent giving is staggering. Here is a partial listing of some 1980 leisure expenditures in the United States:

- \$8.6 billion on sporting goods
- 7.3 billion on new and used boats, fuel, docking, maintenance, and other expenses for boat recreation
- 2.0 billion on recreational vehicles
- 2.6 billion on movie tickets
- · 25.6 billion on stereos, television, and video games

And so the list continues! There is nothing wrong with enjoying the good things of life. But in a hungry world, there should be some kind of reasonable limits on what we spend to enjoy life!

We sometimes make the mistake of assuming that spending money is the same as having fun. That is not always the case! Advertising and the pressure of others sometimes causes us to feel that the more money we have, the better life will be. But how much is enough? And what things bring real pleasure?
