TEST YOUR POWERS OF OBSERVATION

To protect yourself from violence, it's no surprise that you should avoid violent situations in the first place. To do that, it is important to be observant -- to notice things around you. This will help you make quick decisions and avoid potentially dangerous situations. It will also help you accurately describe items, people, or events you have witnessed.

To test your powers of observation, your teacher has set up: (a.) a display of items, or (b.) photograph(s)/illustration(s) for you to look at. You will be allowed to view these items or illustrations for a few seconds only. Take a good look at them. When your teacher instructs you, turn this page over and use the Observations List to write down as many things as you can remember. The teacher may then list on the board all the things that you and your classmates observed.
