Tips on choosing a vocation

In his book, Christian Counseling (Word, 1980), Gary Collins lists six reasons why vocational decisions may be made wisely or unwisely.

1. Social Pressure

Youth may be pushed to make career choices while they are still immature. This often leads to vocational choices that are disappointing.

2. Personality Influences

If a "people" person gets into a job without involvement with people, he may be frustrated.

3. Interests

If a job is boring, it isn't likely to bring much personal fulfillment, even if the salary is high.

4. Aptitudes or Abilities

When we are "doing what we do best," then there is great vocation fulfillment. Workers feel frustrated when they are unable to do what the job requires.

5. Values

What is most important in life? The three greatest influences on career choice are these: helping people, earning money or attaining status, and having opportunity to be creative.

6. Divine Leading

Most Christians believe that God guides in the lives of His children. Some people want and seek this guidance; others do not.
